

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

Bjork

Pop

(90's singer/songwriter)



- Born: 21 November 1965 Nationality: Icelandic
- Famous piece of music: Play Dead, It's oh so quiet

- Björk Guðmundsdóttir is an Icelandic singer, songwriter, composer, record producer, actress and environmental activist. She is a keen advocate for environmental causes in Iceland
- Born and raised in Reykjavík, Björk began her music career at the age of 11 and gained international recognition as the lead singer of the alternative rock band the Sugarcubes, by the age of 21
- She started to study classical music at the age of 5 and released her first album in 1977 (mainly traditional Icelandic folk songs)
- Bjork is known for her distinct three-octave vocal range and eccentric persona
- She has developed an eclectic musical style over her four-decade career that has drawn on electronic, pop, experimental, trip hop, classical and avant-garde music
- She is known too for her very quirky sense of fashion and her unique, almost child-like singing voice



- She has written songs for many other famous artists including Madonna but declined to duet with her.
- She has won five BRIT Awards and 16 Grammy nominations

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A message from Miss Gripton : Artist of the Half Term



In 1923, Augusta became one of a group of young American women to be selected to attend a summer art course in France. Her place was later refused because of her race

During the 1920s, Augusta received a commission to create a sculpture of W.E.B. Du Bois, who was leader of the Civil Rights movement (a protest for racial equality)

Augusta Savage

Augusta Savage was an American sculptor who fought against racism, to create a place for Black women in the world of art

- Born on 29th February 1892 in Floroda USA
- From an early age she used clay from the ground to make figures
 - Clay sculptures cast in plaster or bronze



'Gamin'

In the late 1920s, Augusta Savage sculpted Gamin, a portrait just of a black boy. Today, this is one of the few pieces of her work that still exists

She became part of the 'Harlem Renaissance'
— a cultural movement of black writers, artists
and musicians, who believed that the power of
art could bring positive change

Augusta went on to become the first black member of the National Association of Women Painters and Sculptors and also became the first director of the Harlem Community Art

- Augusta opened a gallery showcasing art by black artists
 - Augusta died in 1962 having inspired may



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A message for Year 1 parents from Mrs Dunleavy:

Information for parents and carers

Your child's reading journey Year 1 Phonics Screening Check

Your child has now learned most of the Year 1 phonics in Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised and will soon be preparing for the nationally required Phonics Screening Check, which will take place in June.

What is the Phonics Screening Check?

- The Phonics Screening Check is a quick check of your child's decoding skills.
- Your child will be asked to read 40 words - 20 are real words, 20 are known as 'alien words' (made-up words).

Why do the children read 'alien words'?



- Reading alien words checks children's decoding skills and knowledge of graphemes in a fair way – it mirrors what the children have to do when they read a word that they have not read before.
- Your child will not have seen the alien words before. They will have to use their knowledge of letters and sounds to work out how to read them.

How does the check work?

- Your child will be asked to read 40 words independently.
- The check has been designed to not put your child under stress. It will be carried out by a member of staff who knows your child well.
- It should only take a few minutes to complete, but there is no time limit.

Do I need to do anything to further support my child?

- Continue to listen to your child read their phonics books and read to them daily.
- Your child's teacher will let you know if any additional practice is needed.
- Always ask if you need any further support!

All for the love of reading

- Teaching children the skills of reading will increase their will to read. Children who love reading, choose to read.
- Reading develops children's vocabulary, understanding of the world and empathy.
- A love of reading is the biggest indicator of future academic success! To develop a love reading, children must have the skills to read, which is why we

teach them using phonics.

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A message from Public Health England

Think Measles!

What is measles?

Measles is a very infectious virus, which spreads quickly if people are not protected against it. Measles is currently continuing to spread across the West Midlands. Two doses of the Measles, Mumps and Rubella vaccine (MMR) are needed for maximum protection.

Aversion of MMR is available which does NOT contain pork ingredients. Many rigorous scientific studies have confirmed there is no link between MMR and autism.

Measles can cause severe illness in people who are not protected, especially in certain at-risk groups including babies and small children, pregnant women, and people with weakened immune systems. Complications could mean hospitalisation, permanent disability, and in rare cases, it can even cause death.

Preventing and Controlling infections

Measles is highly infectious: 9 out of 10 unprotected individuals contract the illness when exposed to it. Anyone that is not protected and exposed to measles may be asked to stay at home for a number of days. There is no specific treatment for measles.

The best protection is through two doses of the MMR vaccine. The MMR can be given at any time after a child turns 13 months and parents can book via their GP. The best way to protect babies under 1 is to ensure everyone around them is

Measles is a notifiable disease

In the event of an outbreak, the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) will support in the risk assessment and advise on actions that need to be taken.

If in doubt, follow the <u>Think Measles guidance</u>' and ensure that your report a case of measles to the UKHSA West Midlands Health Protection team.

What are the symptoms of measles?

- Cold-like symptoms such as runny or blocked nose, sneezing and cough
- · Red, sore watery eyes
- High temperature (fever) which may reach around 40C / 104F
- A non-itchy, red-brown rash usually appears 3-5 days later (sometimes starts around the ears), spots may be raised and join to form blotchy patches – which may be harder to see on darker skin tones.

What to do if someone has measles symptoms?

If someone has symptoms of measles, please advise them to stay at home and not attend any setting where it could be spread to others.

If someone thinks they have measles, they should call their GP or 111. People should not go to their GP practice or any other healthcare provider without calling in advance – they should phone their GP or 111 for advice and say it could be measles.

If an early years setting is experiencing an outbreak of cases of infectious disease (2 or more cases), the setting should call the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) on 0344 225 3560 (option 2).
